- To increase of BIPOC and LGBTQIA+ representation in all departments across the board.
- To create safer spaces where past and present students can discuss and understand the history of systemic racism and how to best handle the pressure that artists of colour face to conform within the industry.

Real history is coming to the forefront, and it's showing us that this movement doesn't *just* affect the marginalized. We at Randolph College are with you and are committed to being a part of the change happening in the world today.
